Welcome to another year of collecting with the **Keystone Record Collectors!** I want to thank all elected and appointed officers for their commitment to the club for 2006. A special thank you to the officers who stepped up and performed double duty while I had some personal items to take care of. Thank you to all members for their votes of support for the 2007 officer team and myself.

As you know, we are changing vendor table size from 6 foot to 8 foot, allowing for what we thank will be a more efficient operation. This brings up another situation that we need to take into consideration: dealers renting tables and leaving early, some as early as 10:30 or 11:00 a.m.

Some possibilities to think about for that time period are vendor only and/or vendor and member only time slots with a hefty admission charged for nonmember early shoppers before 9. If the pre-show admission would be made high enough, more people may be encouraged to join. Again no decision has been made except to investigate possibilities. Having a current membership card in your possession when any changes take effect will definitely be to everybody's benefit.

FRIENDS OF THE LANCASTER **COUNTY LIBRARY & KRC TEAM UP**

Many of our members who have attended the book sales hosted by the Friends of the Lancaster County Library, are aware that there are always large amounts of records included in the sale. This event, which is conduced twice per year (spring and fall) at the Overlook Skating Rink, Lititz Pike, Lancaster, is one of the largest of it's type in the world. Recently, WITF-FM Radio, the Central Pennsylvania public broadcasting affiliate, donated their entire record collection to the Lancaster County Library. Due to the size (over 10,000) and quality of this extraordinary classical collection, the Friends of the Library have partnered with KRC to appear at the Pennsylvania Music Expo on a regular basis in 2007. Tom Miller, who heads up the classical records sorting and pricing for the library will be one of the volunteers who will be selling items, beginning at the March 11th show. This special selection of classical and opera will be available for sale next to the KRC stand. If you or a friend is interested in classical records, don't miss this opportunity. These records are in excellent condition, and there are some very unique and rare recordings all priced considerably below market value. All proceeds benefit the Lancaster County Library.

Large 12-Inch Dance/Disco Collection

As reported in the December 2006 issue of **KEY-NOTES**, longtime friend and supporter of KRC, Ken Long, passed away in November, after a lengthy and courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. In addition to his award winning photography, Ken was a popular club/mobile DJ in the 1970s and 80s. Ken's wife of nearly 20 year, Phyllis Long, is interested in selling his lifelong collection of 12-inch dance mix sin-There are also a gles. number of full-length LPs in this collection, mostly in the category of dance/ disco. There are big hits, and lots of obscurities on small, independent labels. The collection total over 2900 records, and is for sale in it's

entirety (no picking) for \$2500. At less than a dollar per LP, this would give a dealer а wonderful opportunity to sell them



at a profit, or a private collector a chance to add many titles to his or her collection. Condition varies from gently played to new. 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The Richard Walton Group is back! Mid-Atlantic fans have been waiting patiently for their fourth effort and it was worth the wait.

This review will take on a bit of a different form this time. What artists are most seeking are quotes *(and in the case of elec-tronic media, sound-bites)* that they can lift and use in promotional and marketing strategy and material. So this review will be comprised of bullet points...

• Every cut works.

• All tracks are prime regional radio airplay

candidates. (Smooth jazz, adult contemporary and soft rock formats especially)

• Junction is the best offering by RWG since 1993's Savannah Blue, a standard in the modern jazz sound.

• No doubt, the trademark unified sound continues and it shows.

• The half dozen band members allow a half dozen other seasoned players to guest on the disc. That's collaboration at its best.

• Stevie Wonder will approve of their treatment of his 1973 classic, Golden Lady, the only cover on this collection.

• Play it, play it, play it!


My favorite tracks are: the title one, Junction, Find an Out, Lost Inside Her Smile, and It's In There Somewhere.

Seasoned songwriter and jazz musician Richard Walton takes a leap of faith with his first vocal effort, Vessel, a sincere foray into spirit-filled lyrics supported with light, catchy beats. Close followers of Walton's music will recognize some of the songs compiled here since he is as at home in music ministry as he is on the jazz circuit. Well-placed, hand-picked talent round out this sincere, upbeat album.

partnered with Walton contemporary songwriter/ musician, Joe Spatarella, on three of the songs - Lost Inside her Smile, tender lyrics beautifully arranged with Jacob Yoffee's tenor sax floating dreamily through it; Revelation, dynamic, powerful testament; and Queen and the Castle, vocals a little confusing in the beginning but a tight composition of guitars, keyboards, and synthesizer keeps it on track.

Believe, written with Janet Gross, a fellow member of the Baltimore Songwriters Association, lifts the spirit with both lyrics and melody. *Lost Within These Words*, a mellow mix, offers another Yoffee-infused tenor sax that just glides through the entire song.



Walton, who is an accomplished musician and band leader, is able to carry those skills over to vocal performance as well. He takes the spotlight at just the right moment and knows the strength of good backing vocals as well.

The only missed-opportunity is on *Light of the World*, which is a beautiful worship piece that doesn't build quite enough. At the end, the choir should just take over, drowning out Walton's vocal lead.

Most songs are a little long for radio play, but pop this CD in your car when you have a little time to spend to rejuvenate your soul. I also like the delicate guitar and light harmony on the bonus track, but you will have to get the CD to know what that is. I'm not saying.
