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
RAMBLINGS FROM THE EDITOR



In March of this year I had the pleasure of attending the Prestatyn soul weekender for the third year in a row. As is the norm, this year's weekender featured five rooms of music. Each room features a different

Johnstown Pennsylvania native Pat Lewis has worked with some of the best in the business including: Aretha Franklin, Jackie Wilson, Stevie Wonder, Ivy Joe Hunter, Isaac Hayes, Lamont Dozier, Darrell Banks and many more. Pat, along with sister Diane and sisters Betty and Jackie Winston, formed The Adorables in the early 1960's. She also sang on some recording sessions with The Andantes. Currently Pat is singing lead with the Vandellas.

Friday and Saturday nights I got to see all the acts perform and everyone put on a great show. I think the best performance of all was when Dee Dee Sharp sang. I also enjoyed the tribute to James Brown, which all the artists came out on stage

Dione La Rue (we know her as Dee Dee Sharp) began singing in her grandfather's church in Philadelphia Signed to a contract with Cameo/ Parkway, Sharp's first record was "Slow Twisting", a duet with Chubby Checker. "Mashed Sharp's first Potato Time" entered the charts seven days after "Slow Twisting", reaching number one in April 1962. Dee Dee appeared on American Time" entered the charts seven days Bandstand four times, a move that fueled her career. Sharp, who married Kenny Gamble in 1967, continued to record until 1984. She still performs live. Dee Dee holds a PhD in Psychology from the University of Pennsylvania.

Among my purchases this year were Lewis, Dee Dee Sharp, Roy Roberts, Morris Chestnut, records by Syl Johnson, the Radiants, Big Maybelle, Eddie Holland, Fantastic Four, and Sam & Bill.

> Some of the other things I enjoy at the weekender are the Friday night dance competition, hanging out with friends, and meeting new people. I also love the overall atmosphere, which always seems to be filled with excitement. I'm already booked for next year and looking forward to it.

TWIST TRIVIA—BY DON MENNIE

Here is a bit of trivia about "The Twist" you might find interesting. When Chubby Checker began to cash in big time with this song in 1960, it naturally aroused the interest of King Records who had put out the Hank Ballard original in 1958. But they did not just rush their vintage recording back on the market to compete with Checker. Instead, the original Ballard tapes were "embellished" with extra vocals and instrumentation (to more closely resemble the Checker version released

on Parkway), and then "The Twist" was reissued! However, the King same catalog number (#5171) used for the 1958 release was maintained. Thus there are TWO 45 rpm versions of "The Twist" as done by Hank Ballard (actually: Hank Ballard and the Midnighters) for collectors to go after: the original take from 1958, and the "doctored" version from 1960. The flip side on each "Twist" release is the same tune ("Teardrops on Your Letter"), and it was not modified in any way.
