

October 4th: Paul Revere (Dick), 76, vocalist, keyboard player and founder of Paul Revere & the Raiders, cancer. The group's first single, was an instrumental ("Like Long Hair"), followed by a slew of successful chart-toppers, ("Kicks",





was awarded an honorary Doctor's Degree in Music from The Berklee College of Music; **25**th: Jack Bruce, 71, Scottish bassist (Cream, Manfred Mann), vocalist and composer, liver disease. He also played double bass, harmonica, piano and cello

November 2nd: Acker Bilk, 85, British jazz clarinetist, no cause given.

1962's, "Stranger on the Shore", was the first No. 1 single in the United States by a Brit on the Billboard Hot 100. **5**th: Gary (Lane) McMillan, original bassist for the Standells, cancer; **11**th: Big Bank Hank, 58, rapper (The

Sugarhill Gang), kidney complications from cancer; 17th: Jimmy Ruffin, Motown soul singer, elder brother of David Ruffin (Temptations), no cause given. This underrated artist had numerous hit records between the 1960s - 80s, including "What Becomes of the Brokenhearted" and "Hold On (To My Love)".







18th: Dave Appell, 92, no cause given. He was a musician, musical arranger and record producer. He was with the group The Applejacks and later involved with the early days of Cameo/Parkway records. His group also played the music for John Zacherly's "Dinner With Drac"; **28**th:

Frances Nero, 71, soul and jazz singer, no cause given. She became the first live performance winner in Motown Records's history, emerging the winner out of 5,000 contestants. She was awarded \$500, a



December 2nd: Bobby Keys, 70, saxophonist (The Rolling Stones), cirrhosis. He played with Joe Cocker and Eric Clapton and then, in London, with John Lennon and the Rolling Stones on albums including "Let It Bleed," "Sticky Fingers" and "Exile on Main St."; 3rd: Ian McLagan, 69, English keyboardist, founding member of Small Faces and a 2012 Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inductee, stroke; 18th: Larry Henley, 77, singer and songwriter ("Wind Beneath My Wings"), Parkinson's disease and Alzheimer's disease. Henley was the lead singer of the Newbeats, ("Bread and Butter" and "Run, Baby, Run"); 22nd: Joe Cocker, 70, an English rock and blues singer and musician, lung cancer. Known for his gritty voice, spasmodic body movement in performance, and cover versions of popular songs, particularly those of The Beatles. Cocker was ranked number 97 on Rolling Stone's 100 greatest singers list: 23rd: Jo Jo Benson, 76, R & B singer best known for his recordings in the late 1960s with Peggy Scott. ("Lover's Holiday" and "Soulshake"). Cause of death was natural causes.

FROM DOO-WOP TO BARBERSHOP by Steve Yohe

From the time I began listening to my parents' 78 RPM records and watching Your Hit Parade with them, I've loved music. I would sing along with Dusty Fletcher, Eileen Barton, the Ink Spots, and the Mills Brothers, to name just a few. With the passing of time came the inevitable influence of neighborhood friends, and my attention shifted to the early rock and roll hits.

In our teens some of us began yearning to emulate the singers on the records we heard on the radio and shared with each other. My biggest influence was Bill Teats, a knowledgeable, talented neighbor, who began teaching me guitar chords and vocal harmony. Along with lead singer Frank Brommer, an older, married guy from nearby, we formed Monty and the Counts and practiced "Baby Blue," a group-harmony hit at the time by the Echoes. Bill and I sang background harmony, and Bill, the only musician in the group, played guitar. Soon we found ourselves singing on stage at a talent night at the Columbia (PA) Teenage Club. It was exciting but short-lived because Frank's wife forced him to quit the group to concentrate on his family responsibilities. (continued, page two)

Undeterred, Bill and I found other people with the same idea, and eventually formed the Pharaohs. Personnel varied, but I especially remember Ronnie Aungst as another singer, Bob Nolt on keyboard, and Bo Eddy on drums along with Bill and me. The biggest job we had was the entertainment for our high school athletic awards banquet.

Around this time, I dropped out of the group and missed making local music history as the group went on, with many personnel changes, to become Little Duck and the Drakes. The group eventually recorded two highly collectible local hits. I prepared to start college. That was the spring and summer of 1962.



wasn't done performing, however, because after two different impromptu vocals at various events with the Starfires, a Lancaster PA instrumental group in need of a singer, I was requested to try out as sole

vocalist for the group. After around a year of successful gigs at private clubs, parties, and teen dances, the group re-formed as the Sonics, dropping one of the guitars, changing drummers, and adding a Hammond organ to keep up with changing times.

The jobs and successes continued, but the trend was heading toward vocal groups, so the Sonics evolved into the Respectables, a pre-horn band, seven man R & B/soul group. With four singers, all of whom could sing both lead and harmony, we embarked on an exciting year of battles of the bands, dances, and jobs at a Maryland enlisted men's club. Though we were unable the get a record released, we enjoyed lots of

great audience reactions.

It was at this time - mid 1965 -I realized that my practicing one or two nights a week and performing two or three were interfering with my college work. I had to make a choice, and (Yohe is 2nd from



college won out. I reluctantly left the Repectables, and for the next 49 years I contented myself with singing in the car, my record room, my friend Bill's recording studio, and occasional appearances in little theater shows or at karaoke clubs. That wasn't enough, though. I wanted to harmonize, but I couldn't find anyone to work with until I renewed an old interest in barbershop harmony last year.

Last spring I was urged to visit a practice of the York White Rose Chorus and immediately felt at home. Learning that modern barbershop singing has added many newer songs to the traditional ones, I joined the chorus and participated in my first competition with the group. It was a great learning experience, and I've become very active in performing, including appearances at local venues, a successful fall concert, and numerous Christmas shows. I especially enjoy barbershop because the singing is a cappella, another interest of mine. Plus, I haven't really abandoned my desire to sing doo wop because barbershoppers sing all types of popular songs in their own style. You Tube has many great examples of the variety of music we perform. Try the Musical Island Boys, for example. This quartet from New Zealand won last year's international competition. For a more traditional barbershop sound, try Faces for Radio, who won the international senior championship.



I'm currently learning new songs as we look forward this spring's egional competition and working on forming a quartet, as

vet unnamed. Maybe the Respectables will live again in a slightly different form!

THANK YOU FOR THE MUSIC Painstakingly compiled by: B. Derek Shaw A farewell to some of the talent who passed away in 2014.



January 2nd: Jay Traynor, 70, original lead singer of Jay and the Americans, (She Cried), liver cancer; 3rd: Phil Everly, 74, singer and musician and older brother of The Everly Brothers duo, chronic obstructive

pulmonary disease; **7**th: Maureen Gray, 65, rare cancer of the bile duct. Her voice personified 'The Philly Sound' of the early 1960's. Under the direction of producers John Madara and Dave White, cut her first single ("Today's The Day") at age 13 in 1961, followed by "Dancin' The Strand", the next year. Gray moved to England and sang back-



ground with John Lennon, Stevie Winwood and Eric Burdon; 27th: Pete Seger, 94, natural causes. He was an activist, folk singer and songwriter ("If I Had a Hammer," "Turn, Turn," and "Where Have All the Flowers Gone").

February 5th: Larry Lujack, Chicago radio air personality (WCFL, WLS), 73, esophageal cancer. His style with a crusty cantankerousness, influenced present-day radio personalities like Rush Limbaugh and Howard Stern; 18th:



Ben Shatto Barber, 70, two-year battle with bladder cancer. Barber was a well known Central PA radio air personality, mobile Disc Jockey and KRC vendor: 26th: Frank Reed, 59, lead singer of the Chi-Lites, no cause given. In 1988 Reed, became the

successor to former lead singer, Eugene Record and Frankie Sardo, 77, rock and roll musician, cancer. Sardo opened the bill on the "1959 Winter Dance Party tour" in


Clear Lake, Iowa, performing the evening before the plane crash that claimed the lives of Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and the Big Bopper.



March 2nd: Porky Chedwick, 96, natural causes. The "Daddio of the Raddio" and "Platter-Pushin' Papa", Pittsburgh radio air

personality was responsible for bringing R&B music to the mainstream in the 50's and 60's. He was among the first white DJs to play music by black artists on the radio; March 25th: Eddie Lawrence, 95, actor, comedian, singer, no cause given. His unique comic creation, the eternally op-

timistic "Old Philosopher", gained him a five decade cult following.





& The Thrillers, ("Peanuts"); 18th: Deon Jackson, 68, soul singer and songwriter, no cause given. ("Love Makes the World Go Round"); 27th: DJ E-Z Rock (Rodney "Skip" Bryce), 46, diabetic seizure. He was one half of the hiphop duo (Rob Base "It Takes Two" and DJ E-Z Rock).

May 2nd: Jessica Cleaves, 65, lead singer of The Friends of Distinction,

(and later a songwriter), complications from a stroke; 18th: Jerry Vale, 83, pop singer and actor (Goodfellas, Casino), natural causes in his sleep.



June 3rd: Ralph Pruitt, 74, R & B singer (The Fantastic Four), natural causes. "The Whole World Is a Stage," was their first and biggest single on Ric-Tic;

15th: Casey Kasem, 82, radio personality ("American Top 40" host) and voice actor (Scooby-Doo, Super Friends),

Lewy body dementia 19th: Gerry Goffin, lyricist, 75, no cause given. He, along with Carole King au-

thored such Top 40 hits as

"Will You Love Me Tomorrow" and "(You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman"); 27th: Bobby Womack, 70, numerous

health issues, including prostate cancer, colon cancer, pneumonia, and Alzheimer's disease. Womak, a Hall of Fame R & B singer and songwriter was first a member of the Valentinos ("Looking For A Love") and later solo works ("Harry the Hippie", "Sweet Caroline").

July 11th: Tommy Ramone, 65, bile duct cancer. He was the last surviving original member of the punk band, the Ramones. Born Thomas Erdelyi in Budapest, Hungary,

was the band's drummer from 1974 to 1978; 16th; Johnny Winter, 70, cause of death not clear. Hall of Fame blues quitarist, singer and triple Grammy Award-winning producer, Winter was found dead in his hotel room two days after his last performance, at the

Cahors Blues Festival in France; and Ralph Morman, vocalist 65, lingering illness; (The Joe Perry Project, BUX, Savoy Brown); 28th: Glenn Cornick, 67, British bassist (Jethro Tull), heart failure; 31st: Jimi Jamison, 63, vocalist and songwriter (Survivor), suspected heart attack.

August 2nd: Rosetta Hightower Green, 70, no cause given. She was the original lead singer of the Orlons. ("The Wah Watusi", "Don't Hang Up" and "South Street"). Hightower left the group to pursue a career in the UK as a session singer. She recorded with Joe Cocker on his "With a Little Help From My

Friends" LP; 22nd: Don Cannon, Philadelphia morning radio air personality, 74, died after a brief illness. Fans of the first "Rocky" movie may remember Cannon's voice playing himself on WIBG-AM while Sylvester Stallone gulped raw eggs before training. He worked in the biz since 1969 and spent 14 years at WOGL-FM.

September 11th: Bob Crewe, 82, declining health for several years following a fall. He was a songwriter ("The Sun Ain't Gonna Shine (Anymore)", "Lady Marmalade"), singer, manager and artist, Crewe was known for producing and co-writing with Bob Gaudio, Top 10 singles for the Four Seasons. ("Big Girls Don't Cry", "Walk Like a Man", "Rag Doll", "Silence Is Golden", "Can't Take My Eyes Off You" and "My Eyes Adored You", among others. He also wrote for the Rays, Diane Renay, Mitch Ryder and the Detroit

Wheels, Freddy Cannon, Lesley Gore, Oliver, Michael Jackson, Bobby Darin, Roberta Flack, Peabo Bryson, Patti LaBelle, and his own Bob Crewe Generation.
