12. that you recognize as a good song but never need to hear again.



Early KRC Treasurer Jack Coons Passes

Jack Coons, 77, passed on April 14 due to complications from COVID-19. Jack was a club member in the mid-1980's/early 1990's briefly serving as club treasurer, 1987-88. (see picture to the left.) A graduate of J. P. McCaskey High School, Lancaster, he attended York Junior College (now York College of Pennsylvania) and graduated from the University of Georgia, Athens.

Jack served in the U.S. Navy during the Vietnam Era. His career involved sales and marketing. He loved his sports including the Georgia Bulldogs and Baltimore Orioles being his favorite teams. Jack was a model railroader and collector of sports cards and memorabilia. He also operated a sideline mobile DJ entertainment business for many years. Jack loved the beach, spending many vacations enjoying the ocean.

Here's a few remarks from some who knew him.

"Jack was a vibrant well-rounded fellow involved with the KRC-as well as doing some DJ jobs over the years. RIP Jack." - Tom Grosh

"Jack was an upbeat, friendly, and kind person, who loved a good conversation. In my record-collecting experiences with him, I found him to be very considerate and a pleasure to deal with." - Steve Yohe

"Jack may have been the tallest person to ever serve as a KRC officer. He was very involved in the club during our first decade, and always had a few new jokes to tell during show day. As much as he loved music, especially 1960s soul records, and operated a DJ business for many years, his number one passion in collectables had to be baseball cards. The last time we saw each other, he was very excited about a new special edition Topps card he had found in a pack. I asked him if he would save the bubble gum for me in the future. We had a good laugh." - Phil Schwartz



When our shows were held at the Columbia, Pa. Market House (1979-1991), we did not have February or August shows (too cold, too hot.) Each August we held a KRC Good Ole' Days Swap meet at a members' home. The third one was held at Jack Coons place (in center wearing a white cap) in Columbia, Pa. in 1990.

Our members are record and music collectors-some with large collections and some much smaller. There are some who continue doing music-related things like authoring fiction and non-fiction books, compiling research/reference books, serving on music-related organization boards, even appearing on a national music trivia game show. One was even co-responsible for bringing the "home office" to Lebanon, Pennsylvania.

Anyone who has ever watched late night TV in the 1980's and '90's, remember David Letterman shows, first on NBC and later on CBS. One of the features was a nightly Top Ten list. A KRC member, along with friend Jay Putt, both Lebanon City School District teachers, were the creative and physical reasons why the change took place.

Karl (Skip, Coach) Wolf, who has been a member since the mid-1980's, was with Putt one evening in 1990, listening to radio talk show host Tom Snyder how had David Letterman on as a guest. Coach wanted to ask a simple question like how did he like show business, however it was Putt that wanted to ask him a more significant question, specifically moving the home office to Lebanon, Pa. It was Putt's idea, however, he was too nervous to ask the question.

Coach heard Tom Snyder say, 'This is Karl from Lebanon, Pa.' I told Dave we enjoyed his show and then asked him to change the home office to Lebanon."

"I remember he said, 'Done. It's moving," said Wolf. "Jay and I were stunned that it was that easy. But we couldn't tell anyone because we weren't sure he'd do it. This happened on a Thursday and a week later on Tuesday, I went over to Jay's house to watch Letterman's show."

About 15 minutes into the show, Wolf said, Letterman told sidekick and band leader Paul Shaffer that the home office for the Top Ten List had changed. Letterman proceeded to cross out the old home office (Oklahoma City) on a cue card and write in "Lebanon, PA." The home office change was even a surprise to the Letterman writers.

After coverage in Henry Homan's column in the Lebanon Daily News, the word was out. "At that point, things got really crazy. We were contacted by newspapers and magazines. People thought there was office space in Lebanon that was actually the home office of the Top Ten List," said Coach.

Putt and Wolf made numerous trips to see show tapings during that period (always with standby tickets), showering Dave (via his personnel assistant) with gifts to help keep the home office in Lebanon. This included Hershey candy bars, Lebanon bologna, anything having a local tie-in.



Before each show a warm-up occurs, where Letterman visits with the audience answering questions and firing them up. Coach stood up since he not was getting recognized by waving his hand. "I have a gift for you. This is from the home office in Lebanon, Pennsylvania." Dave took the Shuey pretzels and went backstage.

When Dave came out later for the actual taping of the show, he had something under his arm. "He actually came down and handed me a canned ham for giving him the pretzels, but he didn't know who I was," said Coach. ("Big Ass Ham" was a running gag on the show.) Because of his and Jay Putt's efforts, the "home office" remained in Lebanon until 1992.

"I'm proud of being from here. I've lived here all my life," continued Wolf. "But we really didn't do it for Lebanon. We just did it as a whim. We wondered, 'Would he actually do it?", and he did! It sort of put Lebanon on the map, nationally. It happened 30 years ago, and probably many people in town don't even know about it."
