At the September 13th Pennsylvania Music **Expo** we had the privilege of honoring **Jack Supplee** who turned a young 90 years old on September 22nd.

Jack is a lifelong resident of Oxford, Pa., Chester County. He worked many years in the food industry, and after serving in the US Navy, Jack spent the next 30 years working for the Chrysler Corporation. Early retirement gave Jack the opportunity to enjoy his dream of traveling: his first venture a 31-day trip to the west coast.

Jack has always enjoyed listening to music. During his tour in the Navy, a fellow shipmate introduced him to jazz. While visiting local auctions and flea markets with a friend, he discovered what was available and his collecting commenced. Having purchased a collection of more records than he needed, Jack was searching for an outlet to sell his duplicates. And in 1987, he was introduced to the Pennsylvania Music **Expo** in the Columbia Market House.

The show gave Jack an outlet to support his collecting habit. He became a regular dealer, buying and selling while meeting some of the greatest people who shared his love of music. His first mode of transportation was a Plymouth Horizon large enough for an inventory to fill one table at the show, slowly graduating to his current one ton van that he packs like a puzzle. All by himself!

For some time, Jack participated in 4-5 shows a month. He is now exclusive to KRC and the Arbutus, Maryland show where he helps set up tables in the early morning hours. In his 33 years as a member of KRC, Jack has only missed three shows, two due to pre-arranged travel plans and one to a medical procedure.

Jack's inventory contains all genres, but he is particularly successful selling soundtracks and easy listening music. He still collects and listens to records but after a time they become part of his inventory for sale. Over the years, Jack has made generous contributions to the KRC to ensure its future. He has enjoyed immensely the good times and the family of dealers and customers he has met over the years.

Jack has lost two of the most important people in his life, his companion Marty, and most recently his son Barry. Please keep Jack in your thoughts and prayers and stop by to see him during your next visit to the **Pennsylvania Music Expo**.

- There is no consumption of food in the building (except at the round tables in the hall area.)


If you are uncomfortable or do not want to comply with these guidelines, we ask that you sit the show and not





It Really is All About that Bass **By Dan Wolfe**

It's pronounced "base" and it's not a fish. As much as we all know and love the legendary electric guitar which has defined many hit records, some of these million sellers would have flopped (like the fish out of water,) if that specific bass guitar part had not been in there. With all due respect to the guitar legends, don't forget the guy usually standing very still in the background concentrating on that heavy, four stringed instrument. Yes, this is a rant just for fun, but somewhat accurate in my humble opinion.

My Guitar Gently Weeps, but what about that bass? The kids play Guitar Hero as a video game but no one calls it bass hero despite having good bass parts in this game. Johnny Cash sang about his Tennessee Flat Top Box...which is another name for a guitar. If Marshall Grant had not been thumping that steady bass line, many of Johnny's songs would be missing that signature back and forth rhythm he is known for. How about Janice Marie Johnson? Didn't think so. She played that hook of a bass part in "Boogie Oogie Oogie" by Taste of Honey. Listen closely to Sly and the Family Stone. Not many knew who Larry Graham was then. His bass parts were the glue so to speak. Anyone ever hear of Jerry Jenkins? Archie Bell told him to "tighten up on that bass" back in 1968.

It's great that we can all recite the names of 20 or 30 famous guitar players that shaped popular music during the past fifty years. Keep in mind also that in a live

performance these guys seldom play that famous solo exactly the same as recorded and most listeners don't notice. On the other hand, if the bass guitar player misses one note or attempts to be "creative" during a show, the audience will spot it instantly. One misplaced low thump can change the whole complexion of a song.

In my humble opinion, the bass guitar part in live or recorded music, as well as those who play these parts should be recognized. At this writing, Rocco Prestia of Tower of Power has just passed. Despite a spot on horn section and vocal harmony, many of the Tower songs would not have worked without Rocco's amazing "finger funk" syncopation. And finally, if this article was of interest to you, please look up Bob Babbitt, Carol Kay, and of course the king of them all James Jamerson. These 3 not only played bass on many popular hits during the past fifty years, they had freedom to compose or invent the actual bass component of the tune! What would the Temptations or Four Tops have done without Mr. Jamerson's part in My Girl, or Bernadette? Wouldn't have been same. Oh, and Midnight Train to Georgia almost didn't get released because the producers didn't like the feel of it. Bob Babbitt finally was allowed to invent his own bass guitar part and the rest is history. By the way, that's Bob playing bass on Cool Jerk, as well as Stevie's Signed Sealed Delivered.

Even in more modern music the bass rules! Uptown Funk would NOT have gone uptown without that huge bass line that runs non stop through the arrangement as well as in the intro. No, I don't know who played the part without research. So there you have it. Guitars have always the stars of the show, but to me it really is all about that bass!
