Blue Ball Market Update

Several days after the June show, Arthur Price, the Blue Ball Market owner, offered the entire complex for sale at public auction (minimum bid: one *million* dollars). During a 20-minute session, only two bids were made. After brief consideration, the high bid was rejected and the owner withdrew the property. One bidder is still interested and continues to seek suitable financing. That bidder apparently would like to retain all current occupants.

In June, the owner agreed to lease 25 percent of the space we rent to a meat processing wholesaler. That now seems unlikely due to required federal government approval and the possible sale of the building. At the July meeting, I met with Mr. Price for an hour discussing the market situation. Although I attempted to secure a lease for our shows (even at a higher price), he was understandably unwilling to encumber the flexibility of his showroom pending the building's sale. Your KRC officer team remains committed to the long-term stability of the show by staying at Blue Ball, if at all possible.

Other Locations

Weiglestown Flea Market (near York) has folded. Although several vendors hope to revive it, the location and situation do not appear promising.

Host Resort (Lancaster) does not look promising. Existing commitments for events booked 3-4 years in advance leave "very, very few available Sundays" admitted a Host sales representative. It is unlikely that a consistent monthly schedule, such as second Sunday, could be arranged.

Downingtown Farmers Market has an equally large showroom and an impressive amount of parking, but their rent is approximately three times what we would like to pay.

Lebanon Fairgrounds is another possibility, although they apparently would move our show among several buildings to accomodate other events.

If you know of a possible location, we have evaluation forms available at the show. Please contact us at the club address or phone number.

- Doo Wop Concert Video The producer David Applebaum mailed the *Pepsi World's Greatest Doo-Wop Festival* videos directly to our members in late July. The delay was caused by the first two production runs selling out. David has joined KRC (welcome aboard!) and visited our August show. It Bears Repeating

(Editor's Note: In early June, this letter was run in an area newspaper. For those of you who missed it, *Key Notes* is pleased to reprint it in its entirety for your reading pleasure.)

I am a professor of American history writing a book on the history of swing and bebop bands of the 1930s and 1940s. I am hoping that your readers will share with me their experiences of seeing, hearing and dancing to those bands.

We know a good deal about the musical history of these bands, but we know much less about the young people of the 1930s and 1940s who made swing an important part of their culture. I am interested in hearing from people of all ethnic and racial backgrounds who were young during the Depression, World War II and after and who were fans of this music to understand the role of youth culture during these years.

Some people danced at ballrooms, saw various groups ofter movie theaters, or were part of fan clubs. Other people bo larecords or listened occasionally over radio or the jukebox to their favorites. Still others, of course, partook of the bands as part of their World War II experience – overseas, at canteens, at home. Young women responded by swooning to Frank Sinatra during the war.

I would like to hear all types of experiences that people had with the bands and singers of the era, and am especially interested in fan behavior and fan involvement. Where did people dance? Was the music accepted or criticized by parents? When did involvement with the music stop? What were your favorite bands, singers and songs?

I will not use any real names unless authorized to do so. If readers would prefer to send a tape, I will transcribe the stories and send back a copy of the transcription, plus the original tape. Please write to me in care of the History Department, Crown Center 509, Loyola University of Chicago, Chicago IL 60626.


Annual dues are \$18. Guests: First visit free – free will donation appreciated. Set up charge for guests selling records: \$5. No set up charge for members.




If You Don't Pay In Advance, You Don't Set Up
