As she struggled not to faint, he continued to look through the box and said, "Gee, here's another one," and proceeded to give me \$600. I know what would have happened if those two records remained in my \$1.00 box when I entered the hall - I would have been \$2.00 richer and none the wiser!





## **Bedbug Boogie Begins**



### **Jerry Tempestra's Emeralds** ...shining brightly on Back In The Day

Dateline 1955: President Eisenhower is in the White House, at the ballpark it's Mickey Mantle and topping the R & B charts Sincerely by The Moonglows. Yes, life was simpler then, as indicated in the title of the latest CD from Jerry Tempestras' Emeralds, aptly titled Back In The Day on Wolfhound Records.

This a capella quartet hailing from the city of brotherly love, Philadelphia, brings to the foreground, an album of songs paying homage to vocal groups that personified "philly doo wop". Represented here are excellent interpretations of songs by The Superiors, The Tymes and The 4 Javs, coupled with a few rare gems played on WIBG, blaring out of those transistor radios - and let's not forget a long lost *B-side* from Lee Andrews.



The inception of JTs Emeralds', harks back to 1964, when Jerry Tempestra formed the initial lineup of The Emeralds, but unfortunately as in the case of many talented artists at that time, their career was cut short, due to a call from Uncle Sam to serve in the Vietnam War. During the 1990's Jerry saw renewed inter-

est in a capella singing groups. Realizing there was a new audience out there, he decided it was time for a reformation of The Emeralds.

Rounding out the current lineup are Tony Russo, formerly of The Destinations (of Tell Her fame - Cameo 422), Matty Raimo, who spent two decades with the renowned philly favorite Relatives By Appointment and Frank La Faro, who in 1964, as Frankie & The Fashions enjoyed an east coast hit, released on Mercury Records - Funny Girl.

A few standouts on this CD include their reworking of The Casinos "Then You Can Tell Me Goodbye", as Matty Raimo handles the lead vocal chores. While most groups in their genre are doing the tried and true 1950's classics, here The Emeralds take it up a notch by using a 1967 tune and applying the old school "group sound approach". This is quite refreshing and reminiscent of what The Persuasions were doing in the early 70's and The Nylons in the 80's - creating a hip and updated approach to the a capella art form, thus gaining radio airplay, and reaching the buying public.

On the immortal Chapel Of Dreams from The Dubs, Frank La Faro sails into high gear singing with the urgency of a 17 year old kid, practicing at the 49<sup>th</sup> street subway terminal, while Jerry Tempestra gives a solid treatment to the Ted Daryl/Greg Richards penned "She Cried" the first hit for Jay & The Americans in 1962. But the kicker here, is from the Stax/Volt stable. After hearing Tony Russo's soulful plea on The Mad Lads (Don't Have To) Shop Around, you may say it should have been JT's Emeralds version issued on that red and black label from Memphis.

Back In The Day contains sixteen tracks, including four bonus cuts, a must for those who enjoy street corner harmony sounds from the Quaker City and just can't get enough. # Sharon Jones and the Dap Kings with special guest Charles Bradley January 27th Stand-Capital Performing Arts Center, York, PA - A concert review by Cecil Worley

This was absolutely one of the best concerts I have ever attended, from the beginning to the end almost three hours latter. It had the feel of the old soul reviews of the past. Starting with the band playing instrumentals then the opening act Charles Bradley and The Menahan Street Band. Bradley sang "Heart Of Gold" a great reading of the Neil Young hit you could tell was influenced by James Brown, Joe Tex and Otis Redding. The 63 year old from Gainesville, FL also sang selections off his album No Time For Dreaming including "The World (Is Going Up In Flames)", "How Long" and "Why Is IT So Hard" to a very appreciative audience.

Sharon Jones and the Dap Kings came out and blew the house down. Born in 1956 in Augusta, GA and moving to New York at an early age, Jones started singing gospel in church, then doing session work in the 1970's. Finally she started singing solo in 1996 and in 2002 formed The Dap Kings recording their first album Dap Dippin' with Sharon Jones and The Dap Kings then in 2005 Naturally, 100 Days, 100 Nights in 2007 and the latest in 2010, I Learned The Hard Way which was the focus of this tour. The band consists of two saxophones, two quitars, bass, drums, congas and a trumpet.

The concert began with "If You Call" - a smoking hot version of the song. The highlight of the concert was "If I Give You My Love" when a male audience member got on stage with Jones and they danced while she was singing. When she began the song "How Do I Let A Good Man Down" she brought up a group of female audience members with her dancing to the song. Then came the tribute to the dances of the 60's: "The Boo-Ga-Loo", "Camel Walk", "Ride Your Pony", "Tighten Up", and "the Swim". What I think was the show stopper of the night, "Mama Don't Like My Man". The song started with a portion of Sam Cooke's "A Change Is Gonna Come". Jones left the stage and the band said it was time to put the candy down. Then she came out for the encore "Got To Be Where He Is". The band was tight all night. Sharon had a command of the stage and was moving around like Tina Turner all night with a very high energy tour. Best of all she was singing without auto tune or lip-syncing all night. Afterwards she signed autographs and took photos, hugging everyone. In closing anyone who likes 60's and 70's soul and funk would love this show. So if Sharon Jones come to the area again "Boo-Ga-Loo" your way to get tickets - you will not be disappointed!
