This time less than 20 of us saw this outstanding show at the Pleasureville Fire Hall in York.

I found out about Eddie by accident, when I was dropping off KRC flyers at Mr. Mike's Music Store in Harrisburg. In fact, when I mentioned it to fellow KRC member **Bill Trousdale**, he hadn't heard a thing about the show - and he lives in the Capitol city! DEALERS: Please bring new stock to each show for your regular customers. It helps the show, the sales, and the collectors. Everyone wins.


Has anyone made a rare or unusual record find lately? If you would like to share your story, notify one the officers so it can be inserted in the next KEY-NOTES.

Q: Once I have the Real Audio player installed on my computer where can I surf the web to find oldies music I can listen to?

A: When you get back online, cruise over to http:// www.timecast.com, which will direct you to many sites to listen to audio. One of the best sites for listening to audio clips of DJs is http://www.airchecks.com. Doo-wop and rockabilly oldies are found at "Moondawg's Dance Party" is at http:// www.geocities.com/~slifer/. "Marv's Oldies - Music" is at http://home.sprynet.com/sprynet/marv101/Music.HTM. "Paula's House of Music" is at http://www.houseofmusic.com/ index.htm. "Music from the 50s, 60s, and 70s" is found at The Wanderer at http://www.wanderers.com/wanderer/ menu.html?. "The Best of The 50s & 60s" is at http:// www.erols.com/mlbl/best.htm. For ten dollars a year, you can subscribe to great doo-wops at http://www.nb.net/glarkin/. All of these web sites have many links that are definitely worth investigating, so take the time to look at them. There is an Internet radio station at http://www.metroradio.com. It is live fifty percent of the time. The site has a library of oldies from "Greaser Greats" through the 1980s. This library is available at any time. The United Group Harmony Association is on the net. The easiest way to find the web site is to use a search tool to look up "ugha". The "pgha", Philadelphia Group Harmony Association, is also on the Internet. Look for its web address with a search tool. Also, the Preservation of Oldies Lovers

has over 250 members and it's free. There is a link on http://www.nb.net/glarkin/. It is an interesting collection of personal web pages that deal with oldies. These audio files require the Real Audio 3.0 (or higher) player and a connection speed of at least 28.8 kbps. You are welcome to view the sites at lower modem speeds, but if you haven't installed the Real Audio 3.0 (or higher) player, you won't be able to hear the audio treasures on some or all of the web sites. The player is free; a 28.8 modem is not, and not every computer or online service that can access the Internet can utilize Real Audio. A connection at 28.8 kbps is not mandatory, just a 28.8 modem. Connect speeds can be as low as 24.0 kbps and satisfactory results can be obtained.

## SINGLE NAME SUPERSTARS





# MODERN TWANG-AN ALTERNATIVE GOUNTRY MUSIC CUIDE AND DIRECTORY:

### A REVIEW BY STEVE YOHE

What is alternative country music? According to author/editor David Goodman, it's anything that varies from mainstream country music. That would include such diverse kinds of music as rockabilly, cajun, progressive bluegrass, outlaw, and country rock--to name just a few of the diverse types of music included in this impressive work.

Dating his own interest in alternative country back to 1969, the author, who is currently a Lancaster County resident, credits the Byrds' *Sweetheart of the Rodeo* and Bob Dylan's *John Wesley Harding* and *Nashville Skyline* as the works that won him over.



After a brief but thorough overview in the introduction, Goodman presents a 235 page, A to Z compendium of alternative country performers, including such diverse artists as Asleep at the Wheel, the Band, k. d. lang, David Bromberg, David Allan Coe, and Gram Parsons as well as a myriad of less famous people. For each artist there's a brief biography and discography. He even lists email addresses where available.

Modern Twang also includes such useful listings as compilations, record label addresses, publications, web pages, and radio and television stations. The 300 pages of this reference book lend themselves well to either browsing or intense study. Where else can we learn about such unusual styles of music as Lubbock Mafia, gay country, punkgrass, and White Trash Parody? What other books can tell us about such groups as the Pluster Pluckers, Freakwater, Ruthie and the Wranglers, and Salamander Crossing?






Volume One of this nonprofit endeavor features a fascinating article on all of the various incarnations of a band which eventually became known simply as "Legend". The article features vintage photos and newspaper ads and a "family tree" of the group.

Other highlights include articles on The Madison, the popular dance from 1960 (and the movie *Hairspray*), and Buddy Deane's Bandstand. There's also a record review by KRC member **Marty Mettee**.
