

Bandstand The Untold Story

A Book Review by Steve Yohe

This book was written by Stanley Blitz, a former Philadelphian who grew up watching the original American Bandstand while its founder and first host Bob Horn was developing and perfecting the show's successful format – more than five years before Dick Clark was installed as the host. The book chronicles Bob Horn's origins, the creation of Bandstand, its growth as a regional hit, and Horn's ultimate removal as host of the show through a series of events which the author claims were the result of a conspiracy to oust Horn – even though he was extremely popular with the public – and replace him wth Dick Clark, a younger host who was more popular with the station's management.

The book works best when it is telling about the show's early days and the day by day evolution of the show from infancy to powerhouse hit. He achieves this with numerous photos, newspaper clippings, letters, and first-hand accounts by such impressive sources as Tony Mammarella, the show's producer.

The author's purpose is twofold. First, he wants to set the record straight about Horn's demise as show host, which the public has been led to believe was the result of DWIs and a morals charge. However, Blitz presents some convincing evidence that Horn was framed on at least two of the charges against him and that even the third charge is suspect. Circumstantial evidence is presented to imply that at least one WFIL-TV executive was behind a plot to discredit Horn. Second, Blitz feels that Horn deserves to be

posthumously inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame right beside Alan Freed. Horn was playing many of the same rhythm and blues hits on his radio show and on the early *Bandstand* TV show that Freed was playing in the early 50's.

While I found the subject matter compelling and the author's intentions sincere, I am extremely puzzled that more time was not spent in editing the book – especially since the book was credited as being "told to John Pritchard." Neither Blitz or Pritchard had the ability to tell the story with any clearness and conciseness, and it seems that little or no proofreading was done. Therefore, the reader must wade through all the errors his or her high school composition teacher warned about: redundancies, typographical errors, sentence fragments, agreement errors, tense shifts, lack of parallelism, comma splices, and missing commas. The sentence structure is rambling and convoluted with numerous asides that should be set off in parentheses rather than with commas – when commas are used at all. Finally, the author harps on the conspiracy theory repeatedly to the point of overkill.

All these editing and proofreading problems make *Bandstand The Untold Story* extremely difficult to follow in places, but if you're willing to work hard at analyzing the sentence structure and read and reread the underpunctuated sections, the book provides some fascinating reading about the little-known origins of an American musical institution.

More Doo-Wop CD Series Now Available

Bob Miles (Live Gold Productions) is winding down his *Million Dollars Worth of Doo-Wop* and related series by the end of this year. After releasing DJ aircheck CDs of Alan Freed, Jocko and other mostly New York radio jocks, Bob plans to go into the business of reproducing vintage concert souvenir programs (see *Key Notes* #101 for his most recent offering to KRC members).

While Bob is changing directions, we welcome Ken Fuchs to the arena. Ken, who owns Rhythm Records in Brooklyn, has a series of CDs worth adding to your collection. He released many of these discs in collaboration with Ed Engel (author of the book White and Still Allright). The quality, although not perfect, is at a level above the early Live Gold releases. The selections are rare and sought after by collectors of vintage group harmony sounds.

Ken has agreed to extend special pricing to KRC members who would like to acquire any or all of these titles for their collections.

Rhythm Records CD Offer

All titles include shipping bulk rate to KRC for distribution. If you want them mailed directly to you, add \$1 per disc, otherwise they will be available through KRC Treasurer Charlie Reinhart at the December, January and February shows for your pickup. There is no limit on the quantity of each title that you order. Deadline for placing an order is at the November 9th show.

Rare and Unreleased Group Harmony Gems, Vols. 1-4 include music from the following groups: Del-Larks, Royal Teentones, Spices, Academics, 4 Deans, Five Secrets, Marquees, Golden Bells, La Salles, Five Thrills, Billboards, Brightones, Holidays, Gems, Ebbtides, the Decoys and more. These are only \$10 each. (City Sounds label)

Remembering Rhythm Records, The West Coast R&B Vocal Group Sound contains music from: the Mondellos, Tempos, the Lyrics, Rudy Lambert, the Spinners and more. A great CD (my favorite from the entire batch although the rest of the offerings are not too shabby). This is also available for \$10 each. (Rhythm Records)

The final three offerings are all available at \$8 each:

- (1) The Crosstones a white doo-wop (and Christmas, Country and Gospel) group that sounds real good. They do original contemporary group harmony tunes in addition to covers. First CD effort for New Jersey group together for 20 yrs. (Crystal Ball label)
- (2) The Bandaleers *They Sang in Philly* do cover versions of great doo-wop songs and their own material. Bonus tracks from Frankie & The Fashions and Remember When. (Crystal Ball label)
- (3) The Best of Christy and Bella Two obscure labels that had doo-wop groups. Included are: the Jades, Martells, Treys, Savoys, and artists like Bonnie Graham, Hayward Davis, Al & Nettie and James Powell. (Americatone International)


If you are a "heavy duty" doo-wop fan, these discs need to be in your collection.
